American Jews and the Media

Rutgers University

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NOTE: This is an intermediate-level undergraduate course with no prerequisites. It is cross-listed with American Studies and Comparative Literature and was last taught in 2005. The course meets once a week for a double session (3 hours), and students are expected to screen or listen to assigned media works (sound recordings, films and telecasts on video), available in a media library on campus, between sessions. I have reshaped both the content of the course and the assignments over the years and continue to do so to accommodate both new media works and secondary materials.

Course description:

This course examines the wide range of interactions that American Jews have had with sound recordings, film, radio, television, and computers over the course of the twentieth century. Attention is placed not only on feature films, popular television series, and other significant works of American media by or about Jews, but also on the roles that all these media have played in shaping American Jewish life from the period of East European Jews' mass emigration to America at the beginning of the century (e.g., early sound recordings, early silent film) to the present (especially the use of videos and computers in transforming traditional Jewish community life). Special attention is placed on the use of new media for self-portraiture, propaganda, and collective memory.

Course requirements:

1. <u>Attendance, preparation for, and active participation in all sessions</u>. Students are required to prepare for in-class discussion all assigned readings and screenings/listening selections in advance of each session.

2. <u>Write **eight** out of **thirteen** response papers</u>, each 2 double-spaced pages (i.e., 500-600 words), on the reading and/or media work to be prepared for each class. Students choose the papers they wish to write. Papers are due the day that the works in question are discussed; late submissions are not accepted. Guidelines for papers are distributed at least one week before they are due.

3. Final examination: Take-home essay exam, distributed on the last day of class.

Course grade will be based on class attendance and participation (20%), response papers (50%), and final exam (30%).
